PROGRAM INFORMATION

Our exchange programs are credit-bearing programs that allow international students from our partner universities to take 12-18 credits during a semester spent abroad at the University of Notre Dame. Students also have the option of spending a full academic year at Notre Dame. Students take classes offered by the Colleges of Arts & Letters, Science, Engineering, and School of Architecture. They will be given an official Notre Dame transcript upon the completion of the program. Students will be able to select their courses after they are admitted to the program. Please note that registration for some courses, however, will depend upon the availability of spots and commitment from the department.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Students must be nominated by their home institution.
- Completion of online questionnaire on our [application portal](#).
- GPA of at least 3.0 or higher
- Proof of English proficiency: TOEFL min. 90; IELTS min. 7.0; other proof of English proficiency will be considered. Some students might be required to participate in an interview.
NOTE: Students whose native language is English or who study in a country where English is the main language do not have to submit an English proficiency test.
- Must have completed one year of study at home institution before starting at Notre Dame.
- Further documents:
 - Proof of financial ability, such as bank statement etc. (in English)
 - Personal Record Form (on our application portal)
 - Confidential Reference Form (on our application portal)
 - Transcript (in English)
 - Copy of valid passport

In addition to the above items, students are responsible for their round trip airfare and passport/visa related fees.

HOUSING INFORMATION

Due to a shortage of on-campus accommodation at ND, exchange and visiting international students are not guaranteed on-campus housing. Thus, some students will need to secure their own off-campus housing. Students who wish to live on campus will need to fill out a housing application and will be entered in a lottery. Students living off campus are able to sign up for a ND meal plan and participate in dorm activities despite not living on campus.

VISA AND MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS

All exchange students are required to obtain a J-1 student visa. Upon acceptance into the program, our office will issue a DS-2019 form, with which participants can apply for the J-1 visa at the nearest US Embassy or Consulate.

Before registration, students must submit a "Completed History and Physical Form" to the [Health Center](#). Required Vaccinations by the State of Indiana for college students include those listed under 'A' and either 'B' OR 'C' below:

| A. | Tetanus-Diphtheria-Pertussis: | Within the last 10 years |

| | <u>AND</u> Rubella (German Measles): | One vaccination |
| C. | MMR: | Must have two doses, the first after age one, and the second at least 28 days after the first. |

Highly Recommended Immunizations:

- Hepatitis B
- Varicella (Chicken Pox)
